# International Collaborations

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NAPA is known for its collaborative stance that bridges cultural divides between Pakistan and the rest of the world. Through a joint exchange of workshops and performances, NAPA promotes sharing ideas and artistic cooperation. We typically work with foreign missions and organizations in Pakistan to stage combined projects, partnering with artists from diverse countries such as the US, Iran, Bangladesh, Thailand, Palestine, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Germany, Austria, and the UK.

NAPA has signed a three-year partnership with the Butler School of Music at the

University of Austin, Texas (USA) to promote artistic interaction and exchange opportunities. Selected students and faculty spend a summer in the US, learning from distinguished musicians and imparting knowledge of South Asian music to their students. Butler School faculty members have conducted workshops at NAPA.

Despite the challenges, NAPA remains committed to increasing international collaborations and looks forward to expanding efforts when the conditions are favorable.

## Impact

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NAPA extends its sincerest thanks to the Government of Sindh for initiating the Annual Grant in 2021. This generous contribution has been nothing short of instrumental, empowering us to relentlessly nurture and elevate the performing arts within the region.

NAPA aimed to provide a much-needed mental health safety net to those enduring isolation and trauma during these challenging times.

## **JASHAN SAWAN KA**

Jashan Sawan Ka (A Celebration of the Monsoon), organized by the National Academy of Performing Arts (NAPA), proved a logistical success despite Karachi's heavy monsoon rains. The festival drew large crowds, with the 200-seat Repertory Theatre consistently filled to capacity, reflecting the growing acceptance of unconventional messages and styles of plays.

# NAPA Annual Financial Reports for 2020-21 and 2021-22

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## Financial Overview

Around the world, the arts is an essential part of a country's culture, sponsored through public funds, non-profit arts and cultural organizations. There are three sources of revenue: earned income, philanthropic contributions from private donors, and direct state subsidies. The National Academy of Performing Arts is substantially funded by the Government of Pakistan. Following the example of leading performing arts institutions worldwide, NAPA operates as a non-profit organization on a public-private partnership basis, under which it operates through an annual government grant.

NAPA was incorporated under Section 42 of the Companies Ordinance, 1984. NAPA obtained a license from the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan to operate as a public company with the primary objective of promoting performing arts in the country on June 1, 2004.

Donations and income are exempted from tax under sub-clause (xxxix) of clause 66 to the Part 1 of the Second Schedule of the Income Tax Ordinance 2001.





